

HORACE GREELEY BARNARD III '60

BARNEY BARNARD was born March 24, 1938, in Tulsa, Okla., and died unexpectedly in San Francisco on March 15.

Barney spent his childhood in Tulsa and Los Angeles, and prepared for Princeton at the Webb School (Pomona, Ca.) and Cascia Hall (Tulsa). At Princeton he majored in the Special Program in European Civilization, graduating with honors and writing a thesis on Argentine foreign policy between 1916 and 1922. During the summer of 1959 he was the recipient of a Doherty Foundation Grant for study in Bogota, Colombia. He continued study of South America at UC-Berkeley, obtaining a master's degree in international affairs in 1963 and remaining there to do doctoral work in history.

At Princeton Barney's suitemates included Everett Bond, Bill Galloway, Dick Grieves, Bob King, George Peyton, Frank Montgomery, Jay Turnbull, and Chuck Weisul, all of whom remember him for his gentlemanliness, affability, and humor. A night person, he could be found studying in the small hours of the morning, sleeping in unless roused for a late lunch, or holding court at the Student Center over coffee in the afternoons.

Unassuming and thoughtful, Barney did not embark upon a career after his academic studies but devoted himself to his friends and to self-study. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H.G. Barnard Jr. of Tulsa, and a brother, Keenan Moore Barnard. To his family, the class extends its heartfelt sympathy.
